New Year Ed-i-torial

Let's start 2017 off right – we have a few different topics that I would like to bring to your attention to start off the year. So, let's begin with the obvious.

LAMP's 16th Anniversary Online

When we first uploaded those 200 pages to start LAMP in January 2001, Sue and I never imagined that we would come this far. LAMP has expanded over 1000 times its beginning size and accomplished some unbelievable milestones. We have attacked every major problem area that has been labeled as taboo or unheard of, and systemically created a line of information on them.

A few of our accomplishments include research on: NSS codes, censorship stamps, printers' unions, production codes, silent studios, and poster artists; created dozens of tools to help date and verify posters to help auctions and dealers with identification problems; created the only research database for movie posters; and released 21 industry related reference books.

We have been expert witness in all four major trials concerning movie posters, which ultimately established the division between film and posters. We also supplied material for prosecution and continual reports to the hobby during the famous Universal scandal.

Overall – Not too bad for 2 old fogies down in the swamp!!!

BUT, now, 40 years since we started collecting, we look around at the current situation of the hobby. While there have been major changes since we first fell in love with movie posters, there has only been a tiny step forward in areas such as research, documentation, and preservation. In all honesty, for the hobby to really grow, we recognize more problems that need a resolution NOW than we did when we first started. Many of them, however, we didn't even know about when we first started.

Outside of the hobby, movie posters are still considered a small time collectible, with no regulatory boards, associations, certifications, guidelines, price guides and dozens of contested common problem areas from restoration to consistent grading that need some type of resolution.

So..... there is still an enormous amount of work that needs to be done!

And the best place for US to start that improvement – is LAMP!!

2017 – The Year of Change!

LAMP is **LONG overdue** to be reworked. To prepare for upcoming expansions, we are dedicating **2017** to cleanup, fix-up, change and the expansion LAMP. Here is a glimpse of some of the expansion areas:

Changes to the Database

Part of reworking LAMP is upgrading the database. While we continue to work on the next generation database, some of the expansion platforms were established in the original database. We realized that we could start taking advantage now and continue laying groundwork at the same time. We are making 4 (FOUR) major changes that YOU need to know about. The majority of the changes will be available and usable by the public.

Galleries

One of the platforms needed was to add the ability to work with galleries, groups of images or sets. We have now turned that part on and uploaded 150 galleries into the database for testing. In the database search, it will still be marked like a poster, but instead of a poster, the image will be a generic icon stating what it is. Just below the icon, you click to see the gallery.

Sorting of Production Codes

Since we started the research on production codes, LAMP has become the only major supplier to institutes of information to help identify unknown movie stills. Our last *Movie Stills Identification Book* had over 50,000 codes to help identify unknown movie, short, portrait, series, and television stills (and costumes). BUT, the book is maxed out in 2 HUGE volumes. It was necessary to cut out all tutorials to make room for all those codes.

Since we released our 2 volume edition in 2015, **we have already accumu**lated another 8-10,000 codes. WE CAN'T GO TO THREE VOLUMES - AND we know there is LOTS more to add!

Solution - We have now expanded the database to include specific production codes on individual titles. Members will be able to search by production code.

We have already started loading the most confusing area – **PORTRAIT CODES**. This leads to our next announcement.

Expanding to include PEOPLE

We wanted to TEST the additions of galleries AND production codes. What better way than to make the expansion of including individuals in the LAMP Database and NOT just movie titles. This resolves several problems.

And this addition opens the doors to some new horizons in the hobby. The search bar on the Movie Poster DataBase home page has been changed and the "movie titles only" eliminated. If you are searching for a gallery on a person, for example, to search for Fred Astaire, it is listed in the database as last name first – Astaire, Fred [ACTOR] – since the database is keyword driven, you can just put in "Astaire" in the search.

We have loaded about 150 galleries into the database so far. Each gallery averages 60-80 stills, so about 10,000 stills have been added WITH portrait codes (and YES, even those confusing piles of MGM portrait codes).

Our target by the end of 2017, is to have thousands of galleries and 60,000+ production codes SEARCHABLE in the database.

We think this is a good start.

These new expansions will allow us to expand the production code collection, speed up research time by making them more easily available. It also opens the doors to another major advancement targeted for NEXT year – the compiling of production codes to start research into reconstructing the framework of LOST FILMS.

Become the Marketplace!

While the <u>LAMP</u> database is STILL the most comprehensive film accessory research database ever designed, there has been a side usage that needs to come to the front more. The Movie Poster DataBase needs to move toward becoming the industry MARKETPLACE.

Most collectors do not realize that *LAMP* currently has **over 50,000 posters listed FOR SALE** in the database. One of the primary objectives this year will be to clean up the links, change the presentation side more for the public AND ADD A LOT MORE IMAGES AND PIECES FOR SALE. AND for the first time - we're going to need help in these major expansions. To get that help, we have FINALLY achieved one of our long time goals.

LAMP has associated with THE FIRST NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATION DEDICATED TO THE RESEARCH AND PRESERVATION OF MOVIE PAPER.

The Institute For Cinema Ephemera

LAMP has associated with and fully supports the *Institute for Cinema Ephemera* (ICE). LAMP will be supplying all the research, training and handling of the film material.

Since ICE became an official 501©3 Non-Profit organization on November 19th 2016, the Institute has already received over 200,000 posters donated by several major donors.

Lifetime collectors now have a place to bequeath their prized possessions, particularly in instances where potential heirs may not have the resources or desire to continue to preserve and protect the collection.

Dealers that want to eliminate old inventory or collectors who want to retire and leave their collection in the hands of people that know HOW TO HANDLE THEM – CAN GET A TAX WRITE-OFF for their donation.

FINALLY THERE IS A PLACE FOR YOU TO GO WHERE YOUR CONTRIBUTIONS WILL BENEFIT THE HOBBY.

LAMP will be involved with all research, training and preservation.

Excess posters will be sold off through LAMP to help generate more funds for research, preservation AND DIGITIZING the hobby so future generations can also enjoy movie posters.

LAMP and ICE are planning to attend Cinevent this year to make a presentation and talk with dealers and collectors on the historical importance of the hobby and the collectors that have helped preserve it.



WAR OF WORLDS BRITISH QUAD BREAKS RECORDS AT ASTON'S AUCTIONEERS FILM & MUSIC MEMORABILIA AUCTION

An extremely rare first release Paramount original British Quad film poster for the 1953 sci-fi classic **War of the Worlds** sold for £18,000 at the recent Aston's Auctioneers Film & Music Memorabilia auction. Smashing the pre-auction estimate of £3,000-£5,000, this hammer price represents the biggest sale the auction house has seen.



British quads for other popular sci-fi titles also broke pre-auction estimates. These included: **Forbidden Planet** first release original British Quad film poster from 1956 complete with Robby the Robot artwork, selling for £7,600 beating its estimated £2,000-£3,000 and **The Day the Earth Stood Still** (1951) first release original British Quad film poster, hammering at £4,300 over an estimated of £1,000-£2,000



Always a favorite among collectors, posters from James Bond films also performed well. These include: the first release original British Quad film poster for 1962 **Dr. No**, which sold for £5,600, exceeding an £3,000-£5,000 estimate, and the 1973 original first release British Quad film poster for **Live and Let Die**, which hammered at £550, smashing its estimate of £100-£200.



Over 300 posters were auctioned, which included a 80-poster collection from a former RAF man who acquired the posters while helping out at a force's cinema in the 1950s.

Ewbank's Celebrates Record Auction Year In 2016

Sales Total More Than £4M For The First Time

Ewbank's, Surrey's leading auction house, is celebrating a record year in 2016, with sales of more than £4 million for the first time in its 26 year history. It offered for sale more than 22,000 individual lots during the year, up from 20,000 in 2015.

Chris Ewbank, auctioneer and senior partner, said: "I am thrilled with the results achieved in 2016. It was a fantastic year for the business and we had some truly incredible items for sale."

The most significant trend for Ewbank's buyers in 2016 was the development of live online internet bidding through Ewbank's Live, and the umbrella company <u>www.theauctionroom.com.</u>

Ewbank's took the decision to invest heavily in an online facility to give buyers the same bidding terms for online bidding as if they were in the room. These terms undercut all of the commercial bidding platforms, which charge buyers extra bidding premiums.

The move was a bold one, and has proved hugely popular with buyers; up to 80 per cent of all sales are transacted online in some of Ewbank's auctions, between 30 and 40 per cent being regularly seen by the team at Ewbank's in most auctions.

Ewbank said: "The new bidding platform has undoubtedly made our terms more attractive to buyers, which has had the knock-on effect of increasing prices for our sellers, and leading to increased sale turnover, which was up around 12.5 per cent in 2016. Also, we are being asked to sell more lots."

The most spectacular illustration of the success of this online policy, saw a Polynesian necklace sell for £125,730 (including buyer's premium) to an internet buyer from Paris in December; this was Ewbank's highest price of the year.

However it was very nearly never sold at auction, the owner runs a house-clearance firm and had no idea of its value, having priced it up for £15 in a batch destined for the A3 car-boot sale opposite the auction rooms. But, they had a last-minute change of heart and instead took it in to Ewbank's at Send. Senior partner and auctioneer Chris Ewbank explained that it was a rare late 18th century necklace made out of hair and sperm whale bone emanating from the Austral Islands.



He said that there was a UK bidder in the room who dropped out at £50,000, leaving the successful French bidder on the firm's live bidding platform to battle it out with an Australian phone bidder. The price was the highest sold on Ewbank's Live, and one of the highest sold live on-line by a regional auctioneer in the UK in 2016.

The second highest hammer price of 2016 also came in December from lots submitted from an incredible family archive relating to Commander George Eyre Powell RN, a very distinguished 19th century naval officer; his Naval General Service medal, and its three clasps, sold for £31,750.

Also within the Eyre Powell archive was a diamond ring which was presented to him by Queen Caroline of Naples, sister of Napoleon Bonaparte, on 7 June 1815. It was presented as a thank you token for all he did for her during her flight to safety following the capture of Naples by Austria. The British had agreed to guarantee the safety of the Queen and her children following the King's execution and Eyre Powell was on the escorting ship. The ring, a striking early 19th century diamond quatrefoil with four oldcut diamonds, sold for £8,890.

Another highlight for Ewbank's in 2016 was being the official auction partner for CowParade Surrey, an outdoor art event which saw full-size decorated fibreglass cows appearing all over the county. CowParade Surrey raised a total of £210,000, which will benefit both national and local charities.

One of the colourful herd, "Frontier Cow" was hand-painted by Alexander Creswell, the internationally celebrated, watercolour artist, who is famed for his paintings of Windsor Castle after the fire and restoration, and sold for \pounds 14,000 at a glittering auction event at Hampton Court Palace in November.

From fibreglass cows, to items of important Royal provenance, to exquisite furniture, Ewbank's had a remarkable array of lots for sale in 2016.

The team described a fine 19th century coromandel and marquetry inlaid breakfront credenza as "one of the highest quality pieces of furniture we have seen for years". It sold for £24,130, against a conservative estimate, at Ewbank's three-day Autumn Fine Art sale in September.

A Lalique opalescent 'Sauterelles' pattern glass vase had a final hammer price of $\pm 10,795$. It was in its original Asprey cardboard box and was signed 'R. Lalique France' to base.

In November, Ewbank's historical textiles auction made a total of £155,500. Many of the lots of sale were consigned from an important collection of international historical textiles.

The highest-selling lot of the sale, a fine Moroccan Azzemour embroidered curtain/ hanging which was stitched in silk with a stylized design of birds and insects, sold for $\pounds7,112$. The sale featured items which had Royal provenance, they were presented to the textiles collection by Queen Mary, Queen Victoria's grand-daughter-in-law. They included a pink silk jacket, which were formerly owned by Queen Victoria. The jacket had flared-form bodice and arms, is of pink watered silk and embroidered in solid silver thread passing through the fabric cold for

thread passing through the fabric, sold for $\pounds4,826$.

Entertainment and memorabilia is one of the fastest growing departments for Ewbank's. The highest value memorabilia lot was Christopher Reeve's blue Superman leotard used in "Superman IV: The Quest For Peace" which sold for £6,350. An original poster for the iconic 1980 film "Star Wars: The Empire Strikes Back" had a final hammer price of £3,810.

Ewbank, added: "2016 was a truly fantastic year for us, and we have high hopes that this success will continue for 2017 as we have a full calendar of sales with many intriguing items already consigned for sale. Further to last week's Blog about interracial movies, I watched some of them which leads me to highlight the career of an all American hero: **JIM BROWN**

Jim Brown is indeed one of the very few top professional athletes who successfully transitioned to a movie career (O.J. Simpson being one another but we won't cover him for obvious reasons).

Brown is one of the greatest American football players ever, having been enshrined in the Pro football Hall of Fame in 1971 celebrating his career as a receiver for the Cleveland Browns between 1957 and 1965 where he was named MVP (Most valuable Player) no less than 4 times.

Brown decided to retire early and follow one of his other passions, acting. After a short cameo in the 1966 Western <u>Rio Conchos</u>, he attained instant stardom with his role in the all-male WW2 movie, <u>The Dirty Dozen</u>. His charisma and muscular stature led to many action roles making him the first Black action movie in the late 60's star way before the Blaxploitation genre kicked in.

Jim Brown not only exhibited his muscles but also a great acting sensibility and black pride in movies such as **<u>100 Rifles</u>** and **<u>The Grasshopper</u>** where he single handedly broke the race barrier with sex scenes with **<u>Raguel Welch</u>** and **<u>Jacqueline Bisset</u>**.

Brown played in tens of movies since including Westerns, Thrillers and Blaxploitation classics then retired to pursue some sports related jobs including one with his old team The Cleveland Browns.

Oliver Stone brought him out of retirement in 2000 giving him one of his greatest roles as a Football offensive coach in *Any Given Sunday*.

Despite some controversial domestic abuse cases which led him to jail for a short time, Jim Brown remains an important figure in the Sports and Movie communities as well as within the Black American community for which he is a fierce advocate helping bridge gaps with social involvement.

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Rare "Silent Oscar" Award in Brea \$2 Million Exhibition of Historic Silent Movie Posters



Inspired by posters in Leonardo DiCaprio's home, Dwight Manley assembled the world's largest collection of silent movie posters and has loaned highlights for Brea's centennial.

(Brea, California) – One of the only 15 Academy Awards® ever presented during the silent film era will be a featured attraction in a \$2 million public exhibition of 60 original silent movie posters and vintage early cinema memorabilia, February 19 to April 14, 2017, at the City of Brea Art Gallery, 1 Civic Center Circle.

The historic items are from the world's largest private collection of silent film posters – more than 2,000 of them -- owned by real estate developer, Brea native and former sports agent Dwight Manley. The exhibition, "The Birth of Motion Pictures: An Illustrated History of Silent Cinema, 1910 – 1929," will be displayed by the City of Brea as part of the Southern California community's 100th anniversary celebration.

Nearly 3,000 Academy Awards have been given since the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences first presented them in 1929, but only 15 were ever given for silent films. The rare "Silent Oscar" in the upcoming exhibition of items from Manley's collection was for Distinguished Achievement in Cinematography, and was presented to Clyde De Vinna (1890 – 1953) for the 1928 MGM film, White Shadows in the South Seas.

"This retrospective exhibition of the largest compilation of silent movie posters and memorabilia kicks off the City of Brea's centennial celebration. It will feature exquisite, original silent movie posters, including Academy Award-wining film posters and some from 1917, the year Brea was incorporated," said Christina Mercer, Director of the City of Brea Art Gallery. "The majority of these colorful posters for black and white films are unique; the only known surviving examples of their kind."

Manley became interested in film posters eight years ago after visiting actor Leonardo DiCaprio's Hollywood Hills home. "He had some of the greatest horror film posters of all time, such as Frankenstein and Dracula. I commented how very cool they were. A few years later I needed some art to put on the wall of a new house in Brea, and came across an auction with a couple of neat posters," Manley recalled.

"I have a real appreciation of history, and I learned that most silent movie posters were destroyed as they were not meant to be saved. I began buying them. The largest cache known was in the range of 200 different posters, and I bought them all. The next largest cache was about 110, and I also bought them all. I scoured auctions, eBay, and price lists of silent film posters, and bought everything I could find. Today, I have approximately 2,000 posters," he said.

Among the highlights in the exhibition will be posters from the estate of actor and director Lord Richard Attenborough (1923 – 2014) for the 1918 Charlie Chaplin film, A Dog's Life, and the 1921 Chaplin and Jackie Coogan film, The Kid.

Another version of a poster for The Kid was from actor Jack Larson (1928 – 2015) who played Jimmy Olsen in the 1950s Adventures of Superman TV show and who received the poster as a gift from Chaplin.

The 1927 poster from the so-called holy grail of lost silent films, London After Midnight starring "the man of a thousand faces," Lon Chaney (1883 – 1930), was acquired by Manley from Metallica guitar player Kirk Hammett.

A special reception will be held from 6 to 10 pm on Saturday evening, February 18, for the "Birth of Motion Pictures" exhibition which will then be open to the public Wednesdays to Sundays from Noon to 5 pm, February 19 through April 14. Silent films will be shown daily.

Manley, Managing Partner of Manley Fanticola Holdings LLC, has been actively involved for more than a decade in the redevelopment of commercial and residential real estate in his hometown, Brea.


Brea, California was incorporated on February 23, 1917. February 23, coincidentally, is also Dwight Manley's birthday, although he was born a half century later in 1966.
