#### AN EVENING TO REMEMBER ...

## HISTORIC VITASCOPE HALL MARKER DEDICATION AND RECEPTION



October 14, 2019 marked a very special moment for the Poole family. Our 23-year mission to get a marker installed at the location of the first seated indoor theater in the country came to fruition – well almost.

On July 26, 1896, William Pop Rock and Walter Wainwright opened up a storefront on New Orleans famous Canal Street and exhibited moving pictures. This was the first recognized location dedicated solely to the exhibition of films. Up to that point, movies were shown as a part of other forms of entertainment, as it was believed by most that this was a "passing fad" and that movies alone could not draw an audience. Rock and

Wainwright proved them wrong and ushered in the era of the motion picture theater.

For 23 years, we have tried, without success, to get a marker placed at this site to commemorate this historic event. Finally, with the help of some dedicated and determined individuals, a marker was unveiled, albeit in a temporary installation.

Before the marker was officially dedicated, a reception was hosted by philanthropists and sponsors Russ and Sandra Herman. Catered by the Palace Café, the event was held at the new Sazarac House which is located one block from the Vitascope Hall location.

The over 100 attendees represented individuals from state and local government, the New Orleans Film Society, local entertainment and supporters. Entertainment was provided by the Kinfolk Brass Band.





Sandra Herman emceed a program featuring remarks from those directly involved in the project. A short program of films which were actually shown at the Vitascope Hall in 1896 followed. After the reception, a traditional New Orleans "Second Line," led by the Kinfolk Brass Band proceeded from the Sazerac House down Canal Street to the location of the former Vitascope Hall. The black ribbon was cut by Ed (below left) and Russ Herman (below right) and the marker was unveiled.



#### THE MARKER

The double-sided marker presents a brief history of The Vitascope Hall as well as the only known image of the founders, William "Pop" Rock, Walter Wainwright and projectionist William Reed at the Vitascope Hall location. The marker also reflects its sponsors: "The Poole Collection (that's us) and the families of Russ and Sandra Herman."



#### PERMANENT INSTALLATION

Our 23-year-odyssey would not go off without a hitch, however. Due to a number of circumstances, including the tragic collapse of the Hard Rock Hotel project located just blocks from the Vitascope Hall site, the marker could not be permanently installed. City officials and workers who were scheduled to take part in the ceremony were not available as they were on the site of the collapse. Fortunately, the temporary installation allowed for the unveiling and subsequent picture taking. A permanent installation will take place once city resources are available.

#### A LONG AND WINDING ROAD ...

In 1996, we wrote a letter to the City of New Orleans requesting that a marker be placed at the site to observe its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary. We had learned about Vitascope Hall years earlier from our friend, and movie poster enthusiast, Don Lee Keith. He was guest curator for an exhibit held in New Orleans highlighting Louisiana's rich film history. We met with positive responses to our request, but nothing was actually done to achieve this goal.

For years following this request, we spoke to whomever we thought could help in this quest. Finally, in 2014, Ed and I met Michael W. Domingue, the Louisiana Department of Culture, Recreation and Tourism's Recreational Trails Program Administrator who started the marker process. As is typical when working with government, the application got stuck in the bureaucratic mire waiting for approval.

We all but gave up hope of having the marker when we met author Linda Thurman. At the time, Linda was conducting research for her book *Hollywood South: Glamour, Gumbo, and Greed*. (A great read by the way). As a former movie industry executive, she understood the historical significance of this site. She also shared our passion for preserving movie posters and film accessories which led to her establishing the Movie Poster Archives (but that's another story).



Linda turned to New Orleans philanthropists Russ and Sandra Herman who signed on as sponsors to underwrite the project. With backing, Linda and Michael got the ball rolling again with the aid of Lt. Gov. Billy Nungesser. Lynne Coxwell, who oversees the Louisiana Historical Marker Program, helped with the application process.

Approved and purchased in 2016, the marker has been in storage in a City of New Orleans warehouse. Mayor LaToya Cantrell's executive office director Amy Rodenberger brought the project to the attention of the mayor, who quickly appointed director of constituent services Bryon Cornelison to oversee the crucial last stages of installation.

All of this effort culminated in the unveiling of this beautiful marker, establishing New Orleans' significant contribution to the multi-billion dollar film industry.

#### **PROCLAMATIONS**

As if the marker unveiling wasn't enough, Ed and I were invited to the New Orleans City Council Chambers where we were presented with a proclamation from Councilwoman Kristin Gisleson Palmer and Councilman Jared C. Brossett. Later that day, we were treated to a lunch hosted by Russ and Sandra Herman where we were each presented with a Louisiana Volunteer Service Award signed by Lieutenant Governor Billy Nungesser.





Needless to say, Ed and I, on behalf of The Poole Collection, are now happy campers. The event brought attention to the efforts of Pop Rock, Walter Wainwright and William Reed and what they accomplished. Hopefully, they are smiling down on us.



# STEEL MAGNOLIAS CELEBRATING 30 YEARS OF LAUGHS AND TEARS

Steel Magnolias debuted in 1989 and quickly achieved both critical and commercial success. The film is based on Natchitoches native Robert Harling's stage play, which began as a short story paying tribute to his sister, Susan, a diabetic whose kidneys failed after childbirth. Although Susan and Robert's mother had donated a kidney to Susan, the transplant was unsuccessful and she passed away in late 1985, leaving behind a two-year-old son she had against her doctors' advice.

Harling, an actor who did not consider himself a writer, turned the short story into a play, set "in a beauty parlor on four Saturday mornings over the course of 2½ years," which he finished in just ten days. In late March of 1987, WPA Theatre, a non-profit organization,



mounted the play off Broadway. Soon after, film producer Ray Stark optioned film rights for a reported \$350,000 "plus escalation clauses" based on the length of the play's run and the film's box-office earning. Harling was hired to write the screen adaptation.

**Steel Magnolias** was directed by Herbert Ross and starred Sally Field, Shirley MacLaine, Olympia Dukakis, Dolly Parton, Daryl Hannah and Julia Roberts.

Filming began July of 1988 in Harling's hometown of Natchitoches, LA, the oldest settlement in the Louisiana Purchase territory. A makeshift soundstage was set up at a gymnasium on the campus of Northwestern State University of Louisiana (NSU), where many students were recruited to be extras and crewmembers. NSU journalism professor Tom Whitehead served as a liaison between the filmmakers and the Natchitoches community, and received an onscreen credit as "Production location consultant."

According to various reports, locals rented furniture and props to the filmmakers, while several well-to-do citizens vacated their homes to rent them to cast members. (See more locations on the map on page 20).

Filming in Natchitoches wrapped in September of 1988.

Much of the city and people from all over the region became involved in the production by either acting or watching. Hundreds of local citizens were among those cast to fill the 2,500 parts.

A benefit premiere took place November 9, 1989 at the Cineplex Odeon theater in Century City, CA, raising over \$500,000 for the American Diabetes Association (ADA). Premieres also took place in New York City and Atlanta, GA; including the Los Angeles proceeds, a total of \$1 million was raised for the ADA.





The film also had a premiere in Natchitoches on November 10, 1989, attended by Robert Harling, Dolly Parton, and Daryl Hannah, with a gala party that raised between \$40 and \$50,000 in NSU scholarships.

End credits include the statements: "Special thanks to Northwestern State University of Louisiana, Dr. Robert Alost, President, Jerry Pierce, Assistant to the President"; and, "Filmed in the city and with the people of Natchitoches, Louisiana." The following dedication also appears in end credits: "For Susan, from Bob."

### WHO WE ARE AND WHAT WE DO

For over 40 years we have been involved with documenting, recording and preserving film accessories (i.e., press books, movie stills, movie posters, general press materials, etc.). Our path has evolved from being just collectors to retail and wholesale dealers and eventually to full time researchers. And now our focus is on Louisiana's extensive film history.

In researching information related to our personal collection of original movie posters (see photo below), we realized that there was no central location to find information about our state's history in the filming industry.
